Eileen has since moved to VT with her family. Early on, their mother worked in the kitchen. It is easy to imagine how proud she would be to see the café in operation today.

Whether coming for a bite to eat or staying to see the show, customers find the Vanilla Bean an easy place to be. With wooden floors below and exposed beams above, the restaurant has a warm and comfortable feeling. The main dining room is a gallery dis-





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

"Pomfret may be best known for its picture-postcard private boarding schools, the Pomfret School, founded in 1894 on a lush, green 500-acre campus, and the Rectory School, founded in 1920. The schools provide some of the town's most distinctive architecture. A drive along Route 169, the main north-south thoroughfare and a designated national scenic byway, passes rolling meadows and miles of stone walls. Incorporated in 1713 on land purchased from the Owaneco Indians in 1686.

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

Admittedly far from content with the majority of songs dominating today's radio charts, Jason hovers in a unique space between the literal and the psychological. As a writer, he often provides enough detail to ignite the listener's imagination while enabling them to deliver some personal experience to the equation. Whether you're a fan of great songwriting or power-house live performance, Jason Spooner is an emerging songwriter to watch closely.

For festivals and larger performances the band is sometimes augmented by Stefan Amidon on percussion. They play traditional New England fiddle tunes and folk songs, with some original and contemporary music thrown in. The boys provide rock solid back up and let Lissa go to town on all her favourite fiddle tunes. A truly sparkling acoustic music creation!

The highly praised husband-wife duo, Aubrey Atwater and Elwood Donnelly present delightful programs of tradi-



tional American and Celtic folk songs, a capella pieces, hymns, dance tunes, and original works. 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

Our Pricing Practices

- 1. Sales Tax Included Our prices include the 6% Connecticut Sales Tax. The prices listed on the menu are exactly what you pay. Our prices may seem to be inflated; however, a \$8.50 menu item is actually \$8.02 + \$.48 sales tax. Furthermore, this practice makes it easier for the customer, especially if that customer is a child who has exact change for a cookie. What you see is exactly what you pay - what could be simpler?
- 2. Not Market Standard Pricing We are not trying to fool the customer into thinking that \$7.95 is less expensive than \$8.00. We find this type of pricing insulting to our customers. However, the reason it is used so extensively around the nation is that it works effectively. We don't like that practice, and we also like to believe that our clientele is not so easily fooled.
- 3. No Pennies, Dimes or Nickels Because our prices include tax and we do not price in the standard way, we do not have to use pennies, dimes or nickels. This is a service to both the customer and to us. We don't give you lots of change, and we only have to use quarters and fifty-cent pieces. This also helps our staff to be more efficient performing transactions, which saves time and money. An added bonus is that we don't have to count change at the end of the business day.
